IPWA Wilderness Interpretive Center in early planning stages

We are incredibly excited about our recent agreement with the USFS to work toward restoring and designating as a historical site the Hessie cabin (located at the junction of the Hessie Road and the 4th of July Road)! The IPWA in working with the USFS will work to have the cabin become a Wilderness Interpretive Center whereby we can greet members of the public entering the wilderness, act as a presence of the USFS at one of the busiest locations in the wilderness, and promote wilderness ethics. We have had very preliminary discussions with the USFS and are reaching out to the residents of both Eldora and the North Fork to get their input on our ideas. More details to come!

II. IPWA Wilderness Program Updates

Wilderness Ranger Internships: Our 3rd year is going strong!

The IPWA is providing two Wilderness Ranger Internships during the summer of 2017 (partially funded by grants from the NWSA!). John Kurtz and Jake Michelotti have been having a great summer so far and have been involved in a number of projects - including wilderness solitude monitoring, sawyer certification, summer patrols, and USFS office assistance. The program is being managed by Jim Merryman (IPWA Board member) and we are having a great season. In addition, they are performing weekly readings on wilderness related topics and reading about authors from Thoreau to Muir to Leopold. A huge THANK YOU to Jim for managing this program for us.

Wilderness Summer Patrols: We are having a great summer!

Over 240 patrols completed to date...more than 1900 volunteer hours...close to 17,000 members of the public seen on the trails...2700 dogs encountered with 379 not on a leash...over 50 fire rings removed...numerous downed trees removed from the trails...and we aren't even at the end of July!



As you can see we are having a great summer volunteer season! We also have a number of new volunteers on the trails this year - one of who is Ben Rodman. Ben completed his first volunteer hike this month and here are some of his thoughts:

We have kicked off the second year of our Wilderness Information Specialist (WIS) Program and are doing great! This is a program whereby IPWA volunteers assist in staffing the front desk at the USFS office in Boulder, and manage the wilderness permit process (which can actually take more time than one would think!). We have been able to fully staff these positions in only our second year of the program! One of these volunteers is Scott Oetting (also an IPWA Board member and our Treasurer). Wilderness Interpreter Guide Program: A New Pilot Program starting this year!

We are continuing to work on creating our Wilderness Interpretive Guide Program. The goal of this pilot program is to increase the knowledge of a select group of IPWA volunteers to be able to:

- * lead guided and structured hikes for members of the public in the BRLA (outside of wilderness areas),
- * present on wilderness issues to local schools and other organizations,
- * provide the select group of volunteers with additional resources to be able to speak to and advocate for wilderness preservation and protection.

Board members Daryl Ogden and Yonah Cohen have been driving this program forward for us (along with



working with other volunteers as well). This past weekend we completed our second pilot hike and now are close to scheduling hikes for members of the public staying at Pawnee Camp Grounds. A huge thank you to Daryl and Yonah for driving this program, along with Michael Dalin, Eliza Rayner, and Leslie Brodhead for their help!
