# Bridge Survey Update: Nearly 20 Bridges and Counting!

This summer, IPWA launched an exciting new initiative to collect critical data on the condition of bridges in our Wilderness areas. **Nearly 20 bridge surveys** have already been completed by trained volunteers using a brand-new reporting system. Huge thanks to everyone who joined us for the training and who are out there gathering this important info for our Forest Service partners!


## **Reading Group**

Eager: The Surprising, Secret Life of Beavers and Why They Matter, Ben Goldfarb RSVP

In Eager, environmental journalist Ben Goldfarb reveals that our modern idea of what a healthy landscape looks like and how it was affected by the fur trade that removed millions of beavers from North America's lakes and rivers. The consequences of losing beavers were profound: streams eroded, wetlands dried up, and species lost vital habitat. Eager is a powerful story about one of the most influential species, how North America was colonized, how our landscapes have



changed over the centuries, and how beavers can help us fight drought, flooding, wildfire, extinction, and the ravages of climate change. Ultimately, it's about how we can learn to coexist, harmoniously and even beneficially, with our fellow travelers on this planet.

## **Summer Patrol Update**

Our summer patrol season is in full swing, and your efforts are making a huge impact. Here's what we've accomplished together so far:

- 184 patrols completed (including 11 overnights!)
- 38% of patrols in the Brainard area
- 29% in IPW South
- 22% in James Peak Wilderness
- 12% in IPW North
- 750+ meaningful visitor interactions
- 30+ fire rings cleared
- 1 trail work project completed at Crater Lake Trail with the help of 5 volunteers and other community members

This is a big jump from last year's 140 patrols at this point in the season—thank you for all your dedication and time!





## **Trailhead Hosts Highlights**

Our July 4th Trailhead Host events were a major success!

- East Portal: 9 volunteers counted 368 hikers, 78 dogs, and 25 backpackers, distributing 24 wag bag kits
- Hessie Cabin: 5 volunteers teamed up with USFS staff to greet 560 people, have 50 meaningful interactions, and count 52 dogs and 35 backpackers

We also learned from USFS pro **Brenda Ramirez-Romero**, who shared her expertise on public engagement in the Wilderness.
