

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## Rocky Mountain Wilderness Gathering Recap

IPWA representatives **Fiona Garvin, Sara Raley, and Ainsley Medina** attended the **2<sup>nd</sup> annual Rocky Mountain Wilderness Gathering** Oct 10-12, held at Keystone Science Center. 55 people representing 15 different western wilderness alliance and public lands groups participated, with the goal of learning how best to fulfill our missions to protect wild places.

One of the highlights this year was a panel on Advocacy; what it is, most effective ways to advocate, and how important it is in current political climate to speak up for public lands. We were honored to host **District 8 State Senator Dylan Roberts**, who spoke about how best to connect with one's representatives (regardless of political leanings) and how to effect change in the political arena.

Participating organizations also shared best practices on volunteer recruitment and retention, training, outreach, and fundraising.

# Program Updates

## A Season to Celebrate!

What a year! We're endlessly grateful for the dedication, enthusiasm, and heart our volunteers brought to the trails this season. Thanks to you, it was one of our most impactful years yet.

Here's just a glimpse of what we accomplished together:

- Welcomed our **largest-ever class of new volunteers!**
- Completed **36% more service activities** — including **66% more trailhead host shifts** — and cleared **49% more fire rings** than last summer.
- Launched new data collection initiatives to help the Forest Service better track use trends and maintenance needs.
- Expanded our outreach, from hikes with Women's Wilderness and REI tabling events to our Forest Service partnership at the Farmer's Market and our ever-popular book club.
- Tackled four successful (and fun!) trail work days, kept up our sawyer efforts, and joined the fight against Canada Thistle.

And that's just the highlight reel — thank you for helping make this season one to remember!

Please join us to discuss books about wilderness, nature, and conservation. All are welcome. Come and share your reflections and experiences.


