## A Note From Our New Board Chair

Greetings IPWA Friends,

I'd like to introduce myself to you all as the new IPWA Board Chair. I've been volunteering with the IPWA since 2010, and joined the Board of Directors in December 2019 as the Treasurer. I have worked closely with Kelly Prendergast, our outgoing Chair, during this time, and continue to do so during the transition to make sure IPWA functions smoothly.

My background includes a degree in Environmental Biology from UC Santa Barbara and experience running a camping and backpacking program for girls, as well as teaching gymnastics, ballet, and computer skills. More recently, I have worked as a database manager for several biotech and environmental companies.

As we head into 2023, I'd like to highlight several accomplishments in 2022 as well as our focus in the coming year:

- We are back up to near pre-pandemic levels with 119 volunteers (14 new)
- Our volunteers patrolled nearly 3,000 hours, and walked over 3,500 miles this past summer, encountering over 33,750 people and 5,664 dogs (approx. 8% off leash)
- We re-initiated the Trailhead Host program (thank you Kelly!), with 4 host days at East Portal trailhead. During a 5 hour window on 4th of July weekend, we counted 585 people entering the wilderness at this trailhead - great to have uniformed visibility here!
- Our USFS certified sawyers have removed many problematic trees downed from the winter high winds, helping the Boulder Ranger District keep our high alpine trails open for visitors.
- We funded three Paddon/Gellhorn Research Grants this summer.
- Our 2022/2023 Winter patrols have already set a new record with a total of 26 patrollers (9 new, 17 returning) and a whopping 41 patrols as of early January 2023.

In the coming year, in addition to maintaining our existing programs (coordinated by exceptional and dedicated volunteer Board members), we plan to do some strategic thinking about long-term financial plans as well as organize and codify "how we do things" so that this vital knowledge and experience currently in people's heads is collected and conserved.

Last but *definitely* not least, the Board and I want to thank all of our donors for your generosity - not only in our 2022 fundraising drive, but in your participation in the Eldora Play Forever Campaign. Preliminary results for the Eldora campaign indicate that we will receive over \$10,000 from donors and Eldora's matching contribution. WOW!

I'm looking forward to a productive and fulfilling year for IPWA and hope to meet many of you in person this year. Please contact us at <a href="https://hittage.nih.gov/hitta

# **Crosscut Sawyer Training: May 19 - 21**

We are looking for patrollers to join our Crosscut Sawyer team! We are very grateful to have secured our own training provided through the Forest Service. These classes are highly desired and hard to come by.

#### What is a crosscut sawyer?

Sawyers are individuals who have completed training and certification from a credentialed instructor to safely plan and execute the cutting and removal of large trees. This is especially important in our wilderness areas where no chainsaws are allowed. Fallen trees on the trail lead to rapid trail degradation and increased social trail build up. Removing these trees helps to preserve the wilderness and support Leave No Trace principles.

#### What are the requirements?

- Active IPWA volunteer with one full summer season patrol completion.
- Current OSHA CPR/First aid certification

#### What is the time commitment for training?

- "The Crosscut Sawyer" online training course + completed exam (8 hours). This is free through MSU.
- One Zoom call (evening) and two days of practical and exam on a weekend with the certified instructor.

#### What are the expectations?

Once you have completed the course and received your certification, you will be expected to actively help our sawyer team remove trees throughout the season.
